Write a postcard to a child in Africa. What would you like to tell them about life in England? What would you like to ask them about their life?



Make something from traditional African culture. This could be jewellery, clothing, a mask or a water jug. With an adult, research for many different ideas.

Speaking and Listening

Learn an African song to perform to the class or a small group. Ideas to start with: Kye Kye Kule, Banaha, Nanuma.

You could use the words of the song to practice your cursive writing.

What plants and animals can you spot in your garden? How many different types of birds can you spot? Could you record your findings in a chart?

Can you make up your own homework about our topic?

Who do you think is important in England's history? Research and present what you find out either in a fact file, report or presentation to the class.
